Things to do in Montreal

The Redpath Museum in McGill University is free to the public. It is one of the oldest buildings in Canada, and currently holds large collections in the fields of paleontology, zoology, mineralogy, and world cultures (ethnology). Visitors can see a T-rex skull as well as extinct marine reptiles that shared the Earth with dinosaurs. You can also learn about at-risk species in Quebec at the Biodiversity exhibit, and take a stroll through the outdoor Geological Garden, which features some of Canada's native minerals.

Did you know?

Montreal is the second largest primarily French-speaking city in the world after Paris.

French is the city's official language and is also the language spoken at home by 56.9% of the population in the city of Montreal, followed by English at 18.6% and 19.8% other languages.

While there is a law that protects French and makes sure that French is predominant on everything, English is never very far, making it easy to understand for all non-French speakers. 56% of the population of Montreal are able to speak both English and French.
